Editor's Choice

Carol Phillips

Apart from being a very accomplished photographer, as a past chair, Carol Phillips has made and continues to make a great contribution to our club. She organizes our competitions and set subjects and is always there to assist when needed.

This is her story ...

Way back

when I was wearing mini skirts and had a Beatles poster above my bed, I was given my first camera, a little Kodak, for Christmas. I used this throughout my high school years to take snaps of school activities and school friends.

My next camera was an Agfa Film Instamatic Camera which I was given for my birthday in 1984 ahead of a holiday trip to Kruger. Most of the resulting photos needed a magnifying glass to even see what animal was in the picture. Results were disappointing and I was disillusioned. On our following trip to Kruger, two years later, I was still unsuccessful if the subject was more than 15m away.

It was a decade later, for another trip to Kruger, that my boss lent me his Minolta Camera with a zoom lens. The results were so much better, and in June 1995 I spent my 15-year service award money, R2000.00, on a new Minolta Camera with 80 -200mm lens. Now I was a ready to be a wildlife photographer! My interest in photography grew and I wanted to know and do more...

At that time, we lived in Wartburg where there was no camera club to join. Then I heard of a group who met one Saturday afternoon a month. I contacted the organizer and asked about the group and what they did. He explained that the group was called the "Exposure Club" and invited me to come along and see what it was all about. Not being familiar with photography jargon, and not knowing what was going to be exposed, it took me some months to pluck up courage to go. This was where I learned to expose and compose pictures better.

Once I was familiar with the photography terms and understood the settings, I was still driven to learn more. In 2000, I eventually found out about the Maritzburg Camera Club. That club, established in 1934, met once a month and offered two divisions, prints and slides. I joined and am so glad I did. There were many experienced and talented members in the club. This is where my photography journey really began, I suppose. I started with prints, and after reaching 2 star, advanced to slides and later into the digital era. I was a member there for 16 years, 15 of which I was on the committee and sad to leave when the time came.

On this committee, I was given the opportunity to run the Set Subject meetings and organize the competitions and circuits. In choosing the set subject themes, it was always (and still is) my intention to promote interest in trying out new subjects and I like to think of these themes as a challenge. For me a challenge is a prompt when I may not know what to go out and photograph. The theme topic helps guide me if I am at a loss deciding what to shoot.

In 2006, I attended my first congress in Velddrif, a congress I will never forget! Freeman Patterson, the well-known Canadian wildlife photographer, was a presenter. His talk was "The Best Place to Photograph is Wherever You are Standing at the Moment". His presentation still resonates today, and, to this day, I enjoy

making pictures wherever I am. I have attended many congresses and workshops over the years and highly recommend attending as there is so much to learn.

The photographer whose work I admire the most now, is Elena Shumilova. The way she uses natural light and how she poses her subjects to communicate emotion is something very special.

Initially, when we were able to make annual trips to Kruger, wildlife was my preferred subject, but now in retirement, I favour tabletop/still-life and experimenting with anything that appeals to me. Photography has taught me to look at things from a different perspective.

One has to accept rejection from time to time, but not give up. I applied for APSSA honors in 2010, and on my third attempt I succeeded. My panel consisted of 5 bird images, 2 animals, 2 landscapes, 4 tabletop, and 2 portraits (A bit of everything!).

Then, at my very first meeting of KPS, which I joined in 2016 as a 5-star worker, I received a no award for a nature image, and wanted to creep out the door and disappear, but I didn't. I acknowledge that memory and remind myself that judging is subjective. If I disagree with a judge's comment, I let it go over my head; they are entitled to their opinion and they don't always get it right every time!

I think a desire to make pretty pictures and a determination to get it right is what has helped me achieve for myself what I am looking for. I have also been fortunate with the support and encouragement that Lionel has given me over the years.

Photography has been and still is my passion, and through joining a club I have made new friends and improved my skill. Photography takes me to a place of peace and quiet when I need that space and, so my journey continues.....



We all knew Willem was very ill, when he left SA to return to Holland, but we were shocked when the news of his untimely passing arrived. Few of us realised that he would be taken from us so soon.

We were able to "say our goodbyes" before he left SA, not ever thinking it would be for the last time.

We met Willem through golf and then were delighted when both he and Veronica joined our Photographic Club in 2017. He was already a very competent photographer and participated so enthusiastically and fully in all our activities. It was wonderful to witness the joy he experienced as he ventured, fearlessly and excitedly, into all parts of South Africa, be it the fauna, or flora or geology.

It was our great pleasure and privilege to enjoy his excellent images, taken on his safaris, but also of some new genres he embraced. He was a six star rated club photographer and won many awards.

He was a perfectionist and this showed in his golfing and photographic endeavours. Undoubtedly this was also true for his profession as a Cardiologist and his sailing endeavours.

Soon after he was diagnosed, two things happened in our photo circles.

The first was that Willem and Veronica were able to join us for a photographic weekend away, to Prince Albert, a place he loved. Not only did he participate in all the activities over that weekend, he also produced a wonderful video which we now have as a reminder of him. This is how many of our club members will remember him – active, engaged and contributing.

The second was that, after months of training, he was assigned to judge images at our club night in February this year. He embraced this assignment with his usual enthusiasm and delivered a notable first time effort as a judge. His critiques were clearly thought through, well-structured and, despite his illness, he was able to include humour, much to our added enjoyment.

Our members will also remember this judging session for a long time. He was loved, admired and respected as a member of our club. He will be sorely missed


